


I have grown up as a Pastor's kid in the church for my entire life and Lent sometimes becomes second nature. Of course, I know why Lent is Lent, and of course I know that we have purple cloths that mean royalty and observe a time of fasting and praying...but sometimes it behooves us to reflect on some of the "whys" of such a holy season.

What is Lent? Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lencten* which means "spring." Lent is the 40-day period between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Sundays do not count because each Sunday is considered a "little Easter" as we anticipate the resurrection. The season is 40 days, as an intentional season of preparation. 40 is an important number in scripture: Jesus was in the wilderness. Moses was in the wilderness. In Genesis the flood lasted for 40 days. Historically, Lent began a period of fasting and preparation for baptism for new converts. During this time, new Christians would study, read, pray, and prepare their hearts to live lives following Christ. (So, our new member class seems a lot easier now, right!?)

Why are the dates so random? Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring solstice...spring solstice is March 21, the first full moon after that in 2019 will be April 19 – so Easter is April 21. 40 days (not including Sundays) prior to that is Wednesday, March 6 (Ash Wednesday). During Spring, the days are getting longer, and the light is shining more brightly into the darkness. Especially as the early church was establishing celebrations, festivals, and rituals, the light and the dark factored in quite heavily.

Why Ashes? We begin this season of Lent with Ash Wednesday, which represents a "dual encounter." We confront our own mortality and spend time confessing our sins before God and community. The ashes, burned from the palm branches from the previous year, are symbols reminding us that we are finite beings, and we will all die. "From dust we were made, and to dust we shall return." While we live, however, we are invited to spend our lives in communion with God and one another. Ashes have been used in both Jewish and Christian worship services as a symbol of repentance. To me, I think the ashes provide a priority check — are we living the kind of lives we feel like we should, valuing the things that matter most, sharing and caring for others, and impacting the world for good? We pray the words of David: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right Spirit within me." (Psalm 51:10) This year, we will be offering a brief 15-minute Ash Wednesday service at 7 am on March 6 (so you can still catch your train), and an hour-long Ash Wednesday service at 7:30 pm in the sanctuary.

Why Prayer? Because a heavy emphasis during Lent is on praying and speaking with God, our focus at Park Ridge Community Church is going to be on praying unceasingly. We will explore different ways of praying: for others, for ourselves, for the world, for our futures, etc. We will have prayer stations set up in the Ellinger Transcept (the front right side of the sanctuary) so people can stop and pray during the week and on Sundays in between services. Sunday worship services will dive into the Lord's Prayer or the "Our Father." We pray this prayer week after week, and yet it's easy for the words to become rote. Our time during Lent will help us to understand what we are praying, and why Jesus asked his disciples to pray in this way. We will also be distributing a Lenten devotional – both in written format and electronically via Facebook. Each day, we are invited to pray together as a congregation the prayers that have been meaningful to some of our fellow PRCC members. Some of us are very comfortable praying and opening our hearts to God through words, and others of us don't know where to start. During Lent, we will have the opportunity to learn from one another different ways of connecting to God through prayer.



Why Fasting? Traditionally, Christians consider a form of fasting during Lent. Some fasting included spending a day without solid foods until sundown, using the time typically spent for meals in intentional prayer. Other Christian forefathers would fast for several days. Churches have sometimes invited congregants to give up vices for all of Lent – chocolate, alcohol, gambling, or meat as a sign of our willingness to surrender our will to God's will. Other traditions have invited congregants to add something during Lent – set an alarm and pray each day for 10 minutes in the middle of the day, make a journal and track the people and situations you are praying for, read a scripture passage each day, etc. The goal of fasting or adding a new discipline is not so that we hurt or punish ourselves, but rather that we might draw our hearts closer to God's.

Lent has always been a holy time for me, and I have often experienced God speaking and preparing me in surprising ways. I hope and pray that this season will be a meaningful one for each of us — as individuals and as a congregation. I hope we deepen our relationships with God and one another and that we are prepared in a new way to walk together through the pain of holy week and the passion of Christ and arrive at Easter as those experiencing new life! Thank you for letting me pastor among you and minister alongside you!

## STEPHEN MINISTRY MESSAGE

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. Luke 4: 1-2 (NSRV)

Ever wonder why Lent is 40 days long? The easy answer is because Matthew, Mark, and Luke describe the temptations of Jesus to have either been part of, or to have followed a 40-period of fasting he undertook at the start of his ministry. But again, why 40 days? Was it literally 40 days?

Like a lot of numbers in the Bible, 40 days is symbolic — symbolic of a long period of testing, and trial. Maybe a more modern way to look at such a time would be a time of reexamination of conscience, a time of questioning of our faith, or a time of upheaval — personal or societal. The first Biblical example was the great flood that followed 40 days and nights of rain (Genesis 7:4). Moses spent 40 days on Mount Sinai with God (Exodus 24:18). The Hebrew people wandered 40 years in the desert before they could enter the Promised Land (Numbers 14:33). Elijah spent 40 days and nights walking to Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19:8). Jonah gave the city of Nineveh 40 days to repent or be destroyed (Jonah 3:4).

So we don't really know how long Jesus was away praying and fasting in the wilderness. But we do know it was a long time. And we know what he was thinking about while he was there.

We are told that Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. One can assume that he was hungry – after all he was fasting. But again, this is symbolic. Would Jesus chose to use his power to meet his own need for material comforts? For wealth? He responds to the temptation by saying, "Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God."

The second temptation was to throw himself from one of the highest points of the temple in Jerusalem, as proof of his

authority to command the angels as promised in Psalm 21. With the temple situated on the top of a mountain, the act would have been spectacular evidence of his lineage, and an ego boost. Jesus' response was "Again it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test.'"

Finally, Jesus understood that he could establish his "kingdom" in a political sense. He had at his disposal sufficient power and authority to achieve that goal, the end very much justifying the means no matter the cost in human suffering and oppression. Jesus was confronted with a very real alternative to a leadership model exemplified by selflessness and servanthood. Jesus' response was to say "You shall worship the Lord your God and only him shall you serve."

There are sometimes in our lives when the darkness and despair, trials and tribulations, crises and upheavals with which we are confronted feel interminable. We'd be happy to settle for a mere 40 days, particularly if we could but know there was a definable end to it. But 40 is a symbolic number; there is no telling how long some nightmares can last.

In our times of trouble, we are confronted with the same choices Jesus faced in the wilderness. Will we put our own material needs first and foremost, regardless of the cost to others? Will we blame God and/or make demands that God "fix" things, and then despair if God does not respond as we desire? Will we use whatever means necessary to control the situation regardless of who or what we become in the process?

Or we can say with Jesus that in difficult times we need to feed our souls with God's word and worry less about our creature comforts. We can acknowledge that by its very definition faith requires humility, steadfastness, and trust. We can chose to serve God regardless of the circumstances.

No matter whether your time in the wilderness has lasted 40 minutes, or 40 days, or 40 months, the Stephen Ministry program wants to support your Lenten journey. First, we will be available for one on one prayer after church from 3/10 – 4/14.. Second, the Stephen Ministers will be praying during our Tuesday evening supervision times for each joy and concern offered at worship services. Or if you would like prayers for anything that is troubling you, or to share prays of celebration, please let any Stephen Leader know. Finally, as always, if you are interested in walking with a Stephen Minister, no matter how long or how far you must travel, please contact Pastor Carol (847-823-3164) or Ginny Feurer to discuss it further.

Laura Sissman, Chair of our Congregation alongside Acting Vice-Chair Bill Williams, are helping lead the way as we continue to dream big AND tend to the minutia. Here are a few updates from our Board of Directors:

- Associate Minister Search Team: We have formed an Associate Minister Search team, which is working hard at posting our opening for an associate minister. Along with alumni from previous search teams and staff, our search team has created the job description and posting. When it is done, it will be posted and the team will begin considering resumes, hopefully very soon!
- Board Adopts Covenant: In order to facilitate productive and focused meeting times and clarify what the role of the Board of Directors actually is, our Board adopted a new Covenant to guide our work together.
- Structure Team Continues: Our Structure team is busily working on revising our Bylaws and creating policies for children's protection and more. This new committee will evaluate the staff, provide support to our clergy and staff, refine job descriptions, and give feedback on staff structure possibilities.
- Finance Report: Finance has presented, and the Board has passed the budget for 2019 to be presented at the Annual Meeting. Finance was pleased with the level of pledge support from the congregation and hopes that generosity and joy will continue as we live into expanding ministries throughout our congregational life.
- Board Retreat: We had a wonderful retreat in February. A recap is provided below. One immediate outcome was a

sizable donation from one member because of the optimism, faith, and passion experienced by the Board thinking about and planning for the future. This donation was made in support of our Christian Outreach initiatives.


