Strategy as a Learning Process

For the growth and development of PRCC, we have been engaged in a total evaluation of the church and have been assessing that which is necessary to lead the church into a productive future. As a result, church leadership has been actively involved in making necessary changes. But strategic leadership is more than just introducing change after change. Effective leaders make strategic changes that progressively build on each other. To do this well, all organizations (in this case, the church) discover strategy as a learning process.

"Often strategy is set in [many] meetings and off-site retreats. The outcome is a weighty strategic plan setting out goals and objectives," notes the Center for Creative Leadership's Rich Hughes. "Strategy is rarely thought of in terms of ongoing learning." He asserts that organizations must learn, and those that have the best learning practices develop significant advantages and growth principles.

The Board has certainly been involved in this process and has been learning how to make strategy a learning process. There are six primary elements:

- Assess where you are. This is having a clear understanding of the circumstances facing the church.
 This involves collecting and interpreting information about the external environment as well as the
 internal reality.
- Understand who you are and where you want to go. This is understanding the spoken and unspoken culture of the church and its leadership.
- Examine your vision, mission, and values. Imagine the church ten or twenty years in the future then look at the distance and direction you must travel to succeed.
- Learn how to get there. This is the nuts and bolts of strategic leadership drawing on insight, information, and vision to determine priorities and formulate strategy. This is where the church addresses the human and organizational capabilities that are essential to effectively implementing a development strategy.
- Make the journey. How does strategy translate into action? What are the tactics to take to implement strategy? How does strategy seep into the lifeblood of the organization? This is always an on-going process
- Check your progress. Strategic leadership requires a continuing assessment of the church's effectiveness. This involves looking at indicators of current performance compared with expected performance. How will the church continue to invest in itself to assure a sustainable advantage in the future?

It is good to see the church investing itself in the learning process regarding strategic development. When the church invests itself in the development of its people, it discovers that vitality, vibrancy, and joyous life. And the church will reap marvelous dividends as it goes forward.

STEPHEN MINISTRY MESSAGE

"The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." Mark 12:31 (NSRV)

Pastor David has been talking about the 10 Commandments this summer, and that got me to thinking about how Jesus answered a scribe who overhead Jesus "disputing" with the disciples. (Lest you think the PRCC is the only organization of Christ's followers who occasionally "dispute.") The scribe boldly asked Jesus which was the greatest commandment. Jesus answered that the first is "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." And the second? "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

I don't know about you, but I haven't found either of these commandments particularly easy to implement. (Note: they are not "suggestions." Sigh) Skipping the first one, because my own and my observed difficulties with that one would take a book or two, and moving to the second, I'd just like to point out in my personal defense that Jesus did NOT know my neighbors.

Former Marine Sgt. Jake Wood was honored at the Espy's last night with the Pat Tillman Award for Service. (No, I did not actually watch the Espy's. It was running on the TV my husband had on but also was not watching.) You may remember that Pat Tillman was a professional football player who gave up a very lucrative career to become a US Army Ranger after 9/11. He was killed in a friendly fire incident in 2007. Wood was

also inspired by 9/11 to enlist and serve his country. When he was discharged in 2009, Wood was disturbed by seeing the difficulties veterans faced after leaving active duty. He saw an opportunity after the Haiti earthquake struck in January, 2010. Wood and fellow Marine William McNulty brought together a group of veterans, medical workers and first responders and headed to the island. The outgrowth of those efforts was the founding of the nonprofit organization Team Rubicon. Since then, Team Rubicon has responded to over 250 disasters around the world and has grown to 80,000 volunteers.

Last night Wood said, "Know your neighbor, love your neighbor, help your neighbor. Doing that is the best tribute we can pay to Pat Tillman."

Only God knows what Wood's faith journey is like; I don't know if he has any easier time than I do loving the Lord his God with all his heart, soul, and mind. But Wood definitely has the second of Jesus' commandments well in hand — serving and loving his fellow veterans and his global neighbors as himself.

Stephen Ministers try to reflect that same sense of service and love – not only when it comes to our church family, but especially then. The latest class of Stephen Ministers will be commissioned on Sunday, September 23 at the10:00 service. Your support of their ministry will be important to them and to our church family.
