
As children, my sister Meg and I would almost always go to New Hampshire with our grandparents. My Grandad managed to always take his four weeks of vacation from church in July so he could get to the family summer home, and my parents often sent us with them. Summers in New Hampshire meant mostly warm days but cool night. Days were spent riding bikes, visiting the neighbor's farm, playing pretend, reading books, hiking in the White Mountains, and jumping through mountain streams and rivers. We attend church, a place where my Great-Grandad served as minister (later Grandad did too) and I can still see both he and Mema up front when we're there. We visit the cemetery, where before they died, my great-grandparents told us they would have their bodies placed there, but they would always be in our hearts and with God. The tiny cemetery across the road is holy ground, and now we visit to talk and say hello, not only to Mema and Great-Grandad, but also to our daughter, Halle Grace. New Hampshire is a place where we learned how to breathe deeply and feel God's presence in a renewing, healing, restorative way. This is where I experienced my most significant call/ hunger to be an ordained minister.

I have found, however, that those deep breaths and God's restoration are important parts of summer and can be experienced elsewhere too. I hear from many of you about places you go to find that peace: cottages in Wisconsin, mountains in Colorado, your garden, Crego Chapel...etc. One of the most precious gifts of the summer season is that it seems that the pace of life slows just a bit, and when our pace slows down, our opportunities to notice and bask in the grace of God increase. It's less based on physical location than on our soul's location. I hope and pray that over these summer months, you each find space and time to breathe deeply of God's grace and peace.

Our church office will be "closed" on Mondays over the summer, to allow our Parish Coordinator to have a little more time of deep breaths, while still covering the work of tending to our church needs. I will continue my schedule of taking Fridays off, however, I will spend my Mondays spending time with you. This summer when some of the Bible studies pause and meetings lessen, I hope to get around to visit and meet all of our homebound members. I hope to spend time drinking tea and coffee with you, getting to know more of your stories and who you are. I hope to listen and hear some of your dreams and hopes for our church and community. I look

forward to talking and walking and praying with you. That means I won't always be at the church building, but PLEASE – if you want to have conversation or meet me at church, just call. All it takes is penciling in a time, and you'll find me always at the church when I know you're coming!

I look forward to hearing and experiencing all that God does through PRCC this summer. Many of you will be on vacations, and I hope you do take pictures of "PRCC on the move" with you so we can share in your joy! Whether it's the joy of Vacation Bible Sc hool or vacation with family or just quiet moments, I pray that this season of summer will be one filled with holy moments that restore your soul. Thank you for giving me a couple weeks in July to get away for my family vacation and for allowing me to share in your lives and ministries too! Get ready...summer's here! Thanks be to God!

#### PENTECOST SUNDAY

The second Chapter of Acts tells the story of the Pentecost Day when the Holy Spirit moved through the Apostles after Jesus' Ascension. The day of Pentecost was a Jewish holiday, celebrating 50 days after Passover, after the escape from Egypt and when Moses brought down the law (10 Commandments) from Mt. Sinai. This day when Jews from all around the area were gathered in Jerusalem was one to remember as Peter was preaching and everyone heard their own language. In a reversal of the Tower of Babel (when speech was confused/scrambled), everyone heard clearly the message from God. And, this day, we celebrate the birth of the Christian church! We wear red as a sign of the Holy Spirit and the flames that rested on each one. We use doves as another symbol of God's holy Spirit. This is a special day when we remember and claim the movement of God! WEAR YOUR RED!

## STEPHEN MINISTRY MESSAGE

I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away." Revelation 21:3-4 (New American Bible)

Usually I find the Abbey of Gethsemani in Kentucky a place of comfort and peace. So you can imagine my surprise when I found myself crying through Mass on Sunday morning. Of course I didn't have a tissue because I never cry. (Well, hardly ever.) It was ugly.

The liturgy included the famous vision from Revelation of the new order where there will no longer be death or mourning, crying or pain. I have heard, indeed all of us have heard, that promise a thousand times. But that morning I had a reaction to the sharing in the life of Christ (which is, after all, what communion is) that left me overcome with the misery and the suffering of the world and wondering how God can stand it.

It wasn't triggered by my personal troubles; although everyone has some rotten, difficult things in their life, it wasn't about me. It was the pain all around me. It was the two horribly disabled people in wheelchairs attending mass with their families. It was the bravery of three young women I know who are battling breast cancer as they raise young children. It was the fortitude of a friend whose lone concession to her own debilitating and painful physical condition is an occasional swear word. It was the discussion with my cousins about the struggles of their children dealing with substance abuse. It was the recent deaths in our church family. It was living in a country where racism and sexism and xenophobia are accepted by 40 percent of the population.

So much misery! How is it to be borne by God? By us?

I went for a walk to clear to my head. I took a gravel path out into the woods, and as I walked, I began my usual mantra. "Don't look down. Don't look down." This might seem an unusual chant if you have never been on this path. You should know that the gravel is from a quarry where the limestone was once an ancient seabed. If you look down your eye will catch the distinctive round shape of a crinoid, the exoskeleton of an ancient sea creature. At that point, you will spend your entire walk seeing only those fossils, and filling

your pockets with them, because you cannot help yourself. Thus the chant: "Don't look down. Don't look down. Don't look down."

And then in the second flash of the day, it hit me. That was exactly what I had been doing — looking down! What I should have been doing was focusing on God.

St. Bonaventure (a very cool guy by the way) said that his "whole metaphysics" (aka theological world view) could be summarized as "emanation; exemplarity; and consummation, to be illumined by spiritual rays and to be led back to the highest reality." In other words, God makes God's self and precepts available to us and in us, in order to lead the way to God's kingdom.

Looking up to God is trusting God's promise to be with us when times are difficult, to illuminate the dark places, and to bring to fulfillment a new order.

I have no better answer than Job for why God allows the suffering around us. However, I do know that if you are feeling overwhelmed by painful circumstances in your life, you don't have to keep walking with your head down.
