Are You Ready for School?



"Are you ready for school?" seems to be the question that we are asking all of our students (and teachers, to be honest) as they prepare to go or have just started back to school. It's a question I will repeat to my children every morning multiple times over the next year, hoping that my incessant asking will thrust them into action! In one particularly honest moment, one of my children (who shall remain nameless) moaned and said "No. I don't want to go back to school. It's hard to learn things. You have to listen and think and remember and do the work and do the reading and think and listen and remember. It's hard, mom. I'm not ready."

If we are honest with ourselves, learning is hard. It begins with the foundation of humility, acknowledging that we don't know everything already. Socrates once said, "The only true wisdom is knowing you know nothing." And for many of us who have matriculated through schools, college, graduate programs, trainings upon training, the school of hard knocks, and life itself we tend to think we've got many things figured out!

Jesus' band of followers had been to church, they'd learned their trades, some were more educated than others, depending on their line of work...and yet they came to him with open hearts and questions. "What must I do to inherit eternal life" asked one rich young ruler. "How can a person who's already been born be born again?" asked Nicodemus, the religion teacher. James and John wanted to ensure good seats of honor after a life of being dismissed. Everyone seemed to have plenty more questions. In the Old Testament, folks had

their questions too. Moses asked to see God's face, and God replied that he wasn't ready for that - and showed him instead his backside. LOL.

As we begin this new season of ministry, I encourage you to embrace the questions! I encourage you to open your hearts to the things we do not know and do not understand. Our fall series will invite us all on a journey to understand other people's faith perspectives, even as we examine our own. In a post 9/11 world, in which Muslims and Christians and Hindus and Jews and Buddhists and Sikhs and Agnostics are pitted against one another, with differences accentuated, fears amplified, and ignorance exacerbated, we MUST slow our roll long enough to listen and to learn. Are you ready to go to school?

In some parts of our world, countries are literally ravaged by war, with one religious community persecuting another, committing genocide in the name of religion. In this country, individuals have blown up buildings and mowed down crowds of people in the name of religion. A Christian pastor in Florida made the news as he burned the Qu'ran. Is violence and persecution germane and inherent to religious fervor? Is it possible to learn some of the tenets and traditions of another's religion without compromising your own faith? Christianity has not always been a tradition that has encouraged such a journey. In fact, where I grew up, folks were encouraged to befriend Muslims and Jews, in order that they might be converted and "saved." In his book Why did Jesus, Moses, the Buddha, and Mohammed Cross the Road?, Brian McLaren writes, "Isn't the real scandal not that our religious leaders might be imagined walking across a road or talking as friends together in a bar, but rather that their followers are found speaking against one another as enemies, day after day in situation after situation? Questions like these have always mattered. But in the years since 9/11/01, more and more of us are realizing just how much they matter." (8)

Our church celebrates that we are a place with diversity of faith, but unity in Christ. We understand that each of us comes with a perspective and a religious identity, and we may each one be in different places. But, at the end of the day, Park Ridge Community Church is a Christian church, following the teachings and examples of Jesus. How does our Christian faith inform how we interact with our brothers and sisters of other faiths? What can we learn about God by learning about other traditions? What can we learn about our faith as we learn about others'?

I have been on the phone with some friends and colleagues about participating with us. We are going to take some trips to other faiths' houses of worship. My Muslim friend explained that *Jamatkhana*, the name of the Ismaili Center we will go, literally means Congregation House. He explained, "It's a place of worship and prayer, but also of community, of gathering, of Sunday school...just like you have!"

I know I will be learning alongside you in the next few

weeks. We will ask questions together. We will realize things we knew and things we didn't. We will read, we will see, we will smell, we will touch, we will listen, and we will learn. And, friends, I truly believe - this pursuit will introduce us to a deeper relationship with our God, the God, the Creator of all peoples and languages. We are invited to Encounter the Most High God in/through/because of/in spite of... the diversity of faiths. So, I ask you - are you ready? Let's do it anyway.

P.S. Shout out to Irene Ginger who led PRCC on a similar journey decades ago, and the Faith Development team who thought it was time for us to experience this journey again.

STEPHEN MINISTRY MESSAGE

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and the God of all consolation, who consoles us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to console those who are in any affliction with the consolation with which we ourselves are consoled by God.

2 Corinthians 1:3-4 (NSRV)

I am happy from time to time to provide you with interesting (well, I try) tidbits about some of the most important theologians of the Christian faith. Most of them are long dead, but not all. Most of the not-dead-yet theologians are university professors, with a sprinkling of bishops and ministers, and one pope. But here's the thing, one never knows where "theology" might crop up. This past week, I was blown away by the religious beliefs of Stephen Colbert. (And yes, THAT Stephen Colbert.)

Colbert is unusual in that he is open, indeed matter of fact, about being a Christian, and a Catholic. That's not to say that he isn't irreverent; his conversations with cartoon God (who pontificates from the stained-glass dome in the studio ceiling) depict God as a charming but quirky old guy with an overlong white beard.

In an interview last week with Anderson Cooper (a man of significance in his own right), Colbert talked about the untimely death of his father and two of his 10 siblings when he was just 10 years old. Fighting back his own pain resulting from the recent loss of his mother, Cooper steered the conversation in the direction of suffering and the human condition. He asked Colbert about something Colbert said in an interview with GQ magazine back in 2015.

Colbert, a J.R.R. Tolkien fan, had quoted Tolkien's response to a priest who had questioned his treatment of death as a gift, rather than as a punishment for human sin. Tolkien replied, "What punishments of God are not gifts?" In that 2015 interview, Colbert had gone on to say that he had become aware that it was necessary to "love the thing that I most wish had not happened" and to "take everything with gratitude."

Cooper asked him, "Do you really believe that?"

Colbert paused a long minute before he said, "Yes. It's a gift doing this." (Meaning the conversation with Cooper.) "It's a gift to exist. And with existence comes suffering. There's no escaping that. And I guess I'm either a Catholic or a Buddhist when I say those things..."

Colbert continued with reference to the loss of his father and brothers. "Of course, I want it not to have happened. But if you are grateful for your life, which I think is a positive thing to do.... then you have to be grateful for all of it. You can't pick and choose what you are grateful for."

Cooper asked him what one gets from enduring the losses, in other words, from suffering.

Colbert answered, "So what do you get from loss? You get awareness of other people's losses which allows you to connect with that other, which allows you to love more deeply, and to understand what it's like to be a human being, if it's true that all humans suffer. It's about the fullness of your humanity. What's the point of being human if you can't be the most human you can be?"

Cooper then talked in some pain about his own mother's life and losses, and concluded with, "She said the question isn't 'Why me?' It's 'Why not me?'"

In that difficult moment, Colbert's response was straight out of our shared Christian faith. He tries to console Cooper. He says, "In my tradition, the great gift of the sacrifice of Christ – is that God does it too. You are really NOT alone, God does it too."

God suffers too. In 2 Corinthians, that is the consolation Paul says we get from God, and then as Christians we share that consolation with other human beings – even a TV talk show host named Stephen Colbert in a CNN interview.

It would be foolish to say that suffering isn't painful, and even more foolish to say that it is easy to be grateful for life on particularly bad days. But Stephen Ministry says that Colbert's (and Paul's) basic theology is spot on: You are really NOT alone. And a Stephen Minister is available to be with you for as long as you need a reminder of that fact. Contact Pastor Carol (847-823-3164) or Ginny Feurer (847-840-7082). No monologues, I promise.


SEED PATCH




Consider being a Patch Sponsor

Chair Laura Sissman and Vice Chair Thom Goodwin are attempting to increase Board meeting efficiency with pre-printed agendas, shared reporting through the Google drive, and using meeting time to address action items from the ministry areas and committees. Each Committee Chair was given a binder with printed materials that can be added to as new documents are available. Our new ministry leaders are fully on board and ready to go (or are getting there)! Thom is continually providing workshops and classes on using the Google Drive for Board materials and Committee work. If you need help, please reach out!

A New Staff Parish Relations Committee is born

For many months, the Board of Directors has considered the need for a Committee to address Personnel matters, and in August, a motion was made and approved to form a new Staff Parish Relations Committee. This Committee will work together to outline their specific function; however, each member of the committee will be assigned to a staff person for periodic check-ins and support. This committee will provide problem-solving mediation as issues arise among staff or with the congregation, as well as provide ongoing support for our staff team. The hope is that this team will help foster greater health among our congregation and staff partnerships now and in the future.

Shout Out to the Trustees

The Trustees have been busy this summer, from painting yellow stripes on the stairs to replacing windows, installing a/c in the offices, getting floors waxed, confirming roof estimates then having to regroup when unforeseen events halted progress, AND getting the Carriage House ready for Pastor Mollie!! The list goes on and on, but the entire Trustees team was acknowledged and thanked at our meeting.

Reading, Considering, and Conversing - *Governance* and *Ministry*

The Board of Directors is reading the book *Governance and Ministry* together to consider the structure of our church leadership. Books were given to each Board Member, along with a slideshow with highlights to spark conversation. The work of the Structure team continues as they consider ways to propose organizational changes with corresponding by-law updates. The goal is to increase effectiveness, streamline processes, increase congregational involvement and decrease burnout...sound impossible? Nothing is impossible with God...and we believe that!

How are the Finances?

We celebrate that we continue to have enough money to pay for ministry and surprises as they emerge. Eric Johnson, Treasurer, reported on giving trends, comparing them with 2018 giving. In 2018, May was the strongest month of the year, and this year it was our lowest giving month of the year. Our spending has been kept tight, with several areas spending less than budgeted for 7 months of the year. We currently have around a \$30K deficit in our budget, due to lower than anticipated pledged contributions. We realize as we launch the fall programs, expenses will increase, and we hope that giving will as well! The Board encourages our membership to consider automated giving, as this consistency helps to keep things running smoothly even while we vacation or travel. Senior Minister Report

Pastor Carol reported to the Board about the summer, her plans for continuing education, and the worship planning for the year. This report included sermon series from now through the end of May. Her intention is for the music team, the children's ministry, adult faith, outreach, and more to find ways to connect with worship. The staff also put together an overview of already scheduled ministry events, holidays, special Sundays, etc. for the upcoming year. This helps committees and teams to plan more effectively, collaborating as we go.
